

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I wonder what comes to mind when you read the words "Prayer Meeting"? Do you say to yourself, "Oh no, not for me - stifling, awkward silences? No thanks". Or perhaps you think, "Sitting in a room for an hour with strait-laced, po-faced keenies? I'd rather clean the oven!" Or perhaps your internal monologue goes like this, "Talking to God with other people? I don't even do that very much on my own! No thanks – and I hate speaking in front of a large group!"

Of course, it's always possible that you say, "Yes! I am hungry for more of God in my life, and I want

to see his kingdom come in Otley. Get me to the church on time!"

Even if you were willing to attend a prayer meeting, you may also freely admit that it can be awkward, boring, and uncomfortable at times. Well, I don't think prayer meetings need to be like that, and I have a few suggestions about how we might avoid that in the future. (Yes, we're launching a new church prayer meeting very soon, so watch this space for details.)

1. Come in Faith. We must come to prayer in faith. Whether we are praying individually or in a group, if we come to pray believing that God hears our prayer and has the power the answer it, we are off to a good start. So, check yourself. Am I allowing my mind to be filled with unfounded doubts and negativity towards God, or am I coming to him in faith? Nothing will happen in prayer without faith!

- 2. Come Full. Prayer meetings are not where we come to get topped up in our walk with God. If we come to a prayer meeting hoping to get our walk with God back on track, especially if this is true for many of those gathering, we are guaranteed to have an awkward, boring, and uncomfortable time together, wondering, "Why did we put ourselves through this?!" So, if we all come to the prayer meeting overflowing with strong praise, and hopeful petition, we'll have a more fruitful time.
- 3. Up! For many of us a prayer meeting involves taking turns, and speaking out loud to ask God for things from a long list of wants. This is intercessory prayer, technically, but if all we think about in a meeting are our needs, we will be terribly aware of what we don't have. This is depressing, and makes for a torturous prayer meeting. Rather, if we first lift our eyes to heaven in praise and worship, we will then have a vision for prayer.
- 4. In! A prayer meeting without Jesus is pointless. But he promises us, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, I am there in the midst of them" Matthew 18:20. And so, the Lord will want to minister to us, his people, to strengthen us and empower us to carry his presence into the world, so an essential part of a prayer meeting is listening carefully to the Holy Spirit who may speak through Scripture, a picture or word, to encourage, guide and direct us. That is both exciting and empowering!
- **5. Out!** Having placed ourselves in an awareness of God's presence and goodness through praise, and received from him in ourselves, we are then in a place to reach out to the world around us in prayer.

Boring? Awkward? Uncomfortable? No thanks! Let's come in faith, come already full of God, to look up, in and then out. Let's pray!

We know that you are fairly new to Otley Parish Church, Nathan, and many of us will know you by sight but not really know much about you. Will you please answer a few questions that will help us all to get to know you a little better? Thank you!

When were you born and where did you grow up?

I was born in 1977 in Buffalo. New York, in the middle of a blizzard which has sparked a lifelong love of snow. At the age of 5 my parents divorced, so my brothers and I moved with our mother to Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where I spent the next 42 years.

Did you go to College or University? If so, where?

I majored in Business Management at Grove City College, in Grove City, Pennsylvania. Grove City is a small, Christian university, and the

friends that I made there are still some of my closest friends.

When did you become a Christian?

I was blessed to have a Christian mother and grandparents who modelled faith for me. I accepted Jesus at a young age, and grew up going to church regularly. During university I stopped attending church, stopped taking my faith seriously, and things got a little pear shaped. God did not stop pursuing me though, and it was through seeing people living out their faith, living lives of consequence, that I decided

Jesus was worth taking seriously. When and where did you meet your wife, Erika?

Erika and I met on 6th December 2011 at a St. Nicholas Day gathering at her house. It was love at first sight for me, and I had to try really hard to play it cool, try to talk to other people there, and not just Erika. But I was so taken by her, her heart for Jesus, her love for the church, and her experiences sharing the love of Jesus in China and elsewhere. We started dating two months later, and were married a year to the day of our first date. When you know, you know!

What was your occupation and where did you work? What is your occupation now – and where? Does Erika work?

When we first met. I was managing my family's small business, selling rock climbing and backpacking equipment. This was good training for what I do now, serving as the Farm Shop Manager at Crag House Farm/Caring For Life in Cookridge. Erika and I had been praying about a call to serve the church overseas, and we never expected that call to take us to Yorkshire! We prayed that God would call us someplace where we could serve those on the margins of society, and some place where the local church was small and where we

could be of encouragement. Erika also works at Caring For Life where she is starting an Expressive Arts Therapeutic Project for the vulnerable adults that the charity serves.

Do you have brothers and sisters?

I am the middle of three boys. My older brother is Matthew, and my younger brother is Jesse.

How many children do you have? We have 4 kiddos: Henry (10), Anne (7), and twins, George and Jack (5).

How long have you been living in Otley or nearby and why did you choose to live here?

We've been in the UK since the start of June this year, and are currently renting a home in Adel. Our kids go to school in Cookridge, and we work in Cookridge, so Adel is close to work and school, and not too far from OPC.

Did you worship anywhere before coming to Otley Parish Church? How long have you been coming here?

I had been attending an Anglican church in Pittsburgh for 23 years, so it was important to us to find an Anglican church here. Erika and I wandered into OPC when we visited the area in 2023, and immediately felt at home. We have been so blessed in our 4 months here, and appreciate how

welcoming you all have been to our family.

Do you have a favourite Christian hymn or song?

What would be your favourite meal?


I am blessed to have married an awesome cook. If I had to pick a favourite meal, it would probably be some sort of taco, preferably with a healthy amount of spice.



of Otley Parish Church is now a LICENSED LAY MINISTER

Licensed Lay Minister is the new term for what used to be known as a 'Reader'. It refers to a member of the congregation who has gone through training and assessment and then is formally recognised by the bishop as being able to "teach the faith, enable mission and lead in church and society". The training includes 6 modules, each with essays and some with practical assessments. It also includes a placement in another church or ministry setting. There are regular assessments also of sermons and feedback on the leading of services.



LLMs serve both in their local congregations, and they may take roles elsewhere, such as in Chaplaincy, or in supporting other congregations who find themselves without a vicar.

If this role is something to feel called to, there is a discernment process which explores whether someone is felt to be suitable for the training which takes place both through discussions in the congregation and then with an application process, and finally an interview by a representative of the Diocese. To help someone to begin this process, the Diocese runs a stand alone module called, "Introduction to Theology". This module next runs locally in Spring 2025 and is taking applications now.



Save the date! SAFEGUARDING SUNDAY Sunday 17th November 2024

n this Safeguarding Sunday, we and churches across the denominations will be talking and thinking about Safeguarding - that is, how we support vulnerable people in our communities.

Sadly, many institutions - including faith communities - have failed in their responsibility to ensure that they provide safe places of worship and activity for children, young people and vulnerable adults and have failed to acknowledge and support people who are suffering or who have suffered from abuse in the past.

Churches including the Church of England have responded to recent safeguarding

enquiries and reports by implementing policies and procedures across the denomination and employing safeguarding staff across the dioceses. Recruitment of Vicars and volunteers has been tightened up and safeguarding training has become an integral part of all roles across the church community.

Within Otley Parish Church we have a fantastic team of people who volunteer across many roles in the church – Sunday Club, Youth group, Choir and Music groups, Baby and Little Rascals, Open House, Pastoral Support group, Baptism Co-ordinator, Prayer team, Craftynuts and Newall Ladies Fellowship. Also,

our Sunday morning welcomers, flower arrangers, church cleaners and the church bell ringers. We have a team that take the Bible to local schools as part of the Open the Book scheme and another who take Communion to local care homes, and, of course, we have a team of associate ministers and now 2 Lav Ministers as well as our Churchwarden and all members of the Parochial Church Council. And, of course, I mustn't miss out the Editor of In Touch! They are all amazing people (apologies if I've missed you out of the above list!) for whom we are deeply grateful to God for their service and commitment.

All relevant people have been police checked (DBS) and have taken part in different levels of safeguarding training which are re-checked and updated on a regular basis The PCC has adopted a range of safeguarding policies which are available on the church website - thank you Kevin. Safeguarding is an agenda item at all monthly PCC meetings and there are posters in and around church pointing people to the safeguarding leads in church and in the diocese, and signposting to other support agencies. Please have a look at the notice boards in the church.

But we cannot rest on our laurels. It is sadly true that abuse has gone on in various bodies in plain sight despite policy and

procedure, and we have to be alert to this.

I am hoping that Safeguarding Sunday will be an opportunity for us to 'Talk About It' - to raise issues that perhaps within a church are difficult to talk about, and hopefully as an outcome to think about how we can do things better.

I have just finished reading a book by Harper and Wilson about a Vicar and a Bishop, called 'To Heal and Not to Hurt'. It's a rather disturbing read about the churches past responses to people who have been emotionally, physically, sexually and spiritually abused within the church. I conclude with a paragraph from this book which emphasises the need for us all to be involved in safeguarding:

'The whole church community has to take responsibility for its own safety. Churches can only be safe if everybody at every level within them exercises vigilance, with a positive duty of care towards one another. Only in this way can the barrel become a healthy microclimate, within which rotten apples cannot thrive'.

I hope you will all take this as an open invitation to join us on November 17th to start the discussion about making Otley Parish Church a safe and healthy 'barrel'.

Most of you have probably seen mention of the Craftynuts Craft Group meetings in our weekly church notice sheets.





A Look Back at the Life of Allen

Allen very sadly died in August 2024

I was born in July 1937 into quite a strict Christian home here in Otley. My mother taught me to read the Bible and to pray every day. When I was about 6 years old, I could recite the whole of Psalm 1.

My early school days were at Westgate Primary, and then from the age of 11 at Otley Secondary Modern School, later to become Prince Henry's Grammar School

My parents were members of Bethel Gospel Mission which used to meet in a building on Mercury Row in the town centre. My mother played the organ there and my father was a Methodist local preacher. Sundays at Bethel consisted of Breaking of Bread at 10.30am, Sunday School at 2pm, a Praise Meeting at 3pm and, at 5.30pm, an Open Air Meeting on a street in Otley (often in Paradise Square – now Charles Street car park). There was then an Evening Service at 6pm followed by a Prayer Meeting. Over the years Bethel moved to various premises and just very recently moved into Westgate and at the same time changed its name to Beech Hill Church

The pastor of the Mission in my days was Revd. Sydney Key who proclaimed that all the other churches in the town were definitely not Bible based

As a rebel teenager I decided to go to the Methodist Church in Otley one Sunday and found that they too preached from the Bible, sang and prayed. I couldn't find any difference between here and the Mission Church, so I began to attend the Methodist Church on a regular basis.

I left school at the age of 15 and applied for a job as a motor mechanic at

the local bus company as I had always had an interest in buses. I started there in August 1952 where I learnt how to recondition bus engines.

When I was 17 years old, I went to a performance of Haydn's "Creation" at the Methodist Church. I sat there in the West Gallery and saw three other teenagers sitting opposite me. One of them I knew quite well but I didn't recognise the other two. One of the ones I didn't recognise was the prettiest girl I had ever seen!

After the concert ended, I went over to speak to Margaret, the girl I did know. She introduced me to her boyfriend David and to Kathleen, the very pretty one, who was his sister. I was then invited to Margaret's house with the others so we could all have a good chat. This was my great opportunity to get to know this gorgeous girl. As it turned out Kathleen had just become a Christian at a Billy Graham rally in Leeds two months earlier. She was so full of joy which was something that I knew was missing in my life.

Back in those days Radio Luxembourg was very much the in-thing. That evening we listened to the Hour of Revival programme until 11pm and then decided it was time to go home. I offered to walk Kathleen home, but she refused - I will explain why later. We did though spend a long time sitting on a wall while we said goodnight to each other. This was the start of a loving relationship that lasted for many years.

Kathleen's early years had been very sad. Her father and grandfather were joiners and undertakers whose workshop was in Wellcroft here in Otley. Her grandfather had also made the rowing boats for the River Wharfe in Otley. Very sadly, Kathleen's father took his own life, but nobody ever knew why this tragedy happened. Because of this, her grandfather closed the business. Kathleen's mother remarried a man called Fred which was a marriage of convenience rather than one of love. This was before the days of the NHS and Benefits, and she had three children to consider and look after. Fred took responsibility for them but never loved them. Kathleen's mother had two sons to Fred but later she became ill and was diagnosed with bowel cancer. She died when Kathleen was just 13.

Fred then expected Kathleen to become 'stepmother' to his two sons as well as an unpaid housekeeper. Fred's sister lived opposite and always kept a very close eye on Kathleen. This was the reason she didn't want me to be seen walking her home on the very first day I met her!
