

TLEY PARISH CHURCH is the oldest building in Otley. It's at the heart of our town and, for over 1,000 years, people have been gathering here for worship, with significant family as well as community events.

We are a gathering place for pilgrims on a journey of discovery, kindling hope as we go, and helping one another to be more fully alive to the wonders, the joys and the sorrows of life. We'd love you to share the journey with us.

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Can you remember your first experience of God? (If you haven't had one yet, only seek and you will find!) My first experience of God was in my bedroom at 14 years old, praying desperately for help. I was unhappy, and so it seemed was my whole family. There was no pressure valve, no distraction, nothing to numb the pain. So, I prayed myself to sleep every night that week. And God heard my prayer! Suddenly, as tears streamed down my face, my room, and my heart, were flooded with God's healing peace,

light and love. It brought me to life and put in me a desire for God that I cannot forget. I need more experiences of God in my life!

Yes, even though I have the Holy Spirit living in me, there is a further need for the *manifest presence* of God. I get distracted, tired, and begin to die spiritually, and the answer is always to go back to the source of my life, Jesus.

Psalm 34 tells us to 'taste and see that the Lord is good' – to experience him – and that we are 'blessed when we take refuge in him'. Isaiah says that 'they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength.' But God is not only interested in knowing us individually; collectively, we are the body of Christ, so of course we must be *full* of Christ!

Perhaps the great theme of the Bible is God's desire to be Emmanuel, God-with-us. From his strolls in Eden's cool evenings with Adam and

Eve, to his presence dwelling palpably in the Ark of the Covenant, and later Solomon's Temple; to the incarnation of God's son, and his pouring out of the Holy Spirit upon all believers, birthing the church: God's desire is to *be with us*. Yes, in that fundamental sense in which we simply wouldn't exist as the church without the Holy Spirit, but also in the *manifest* sense. The *palpable* sense of God's presence. This is what happens in a *revival* – we are revivified, re-energised.

Charles Finney warns us that, 'If the presence of God is in the church, the church will draw the world in. If the presence of God is not in the church, the world will draw the church out.' In other words, if our chief purpose ceases to be hosting the manifest presence of God, we will lose our impact on the world around us. And in fact, that impact is reversed. The world is desperately in need of a church that fulfils its God-given purpose to bring the light of the Gospel to bear on it. So, we must not fail in this.

Psalm 34 continues: 'Fear the Lord, you his holy people, for those who fear him lack nothing.' This is not the fear of a dangerous, volatile tyrant.but a deep respect for and desire to please our loving, self-sacrificing God. When we do fear God we will be revived.

But, like you and I, God only comes where he's wanted. So, how can we show God that he is wanted – in our personal lives, our family lives, our collective life? Well, God has told us:

"...if my people who are called by my name humble themselves, and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and heal their land." 2 Chronicles 7:14

God's desire is to be with us, to manifest his presence to us, to heal our land. Let us do all we can to make him welcome.



But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord." (Luke 2:10-12)

as we prepare for Christmas, help us to find time in our busy lives for quiet and thought and prayer, that we may reflect upon the wonder of your love and allow the story of the Saviour's birth to penetrate our hearts and minds.

So may our joy be deeper, our worship more real, and our lives worthier of all that you have done for us through the coming of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Let us come together in prayer.


Carols, candles, and a wonderful atmosphere to celebrate the start of Christmas, putting Christ at the centre.

We know that you are newly returned to Otley Parish Church, Carolyn, and many of us will know you by sight but not really know much about you. Will you please answer a few questions that will help us all to get to know you a little better? *Thank you!*

When were you born and where did you grow up?

I was born in 1952 here in Otley in what used to be the Wharfedale Union Workhouse on Newall Carr Road, which became the maternity ward at what is now Wharfedale Hospital.

Where did you go to school?

My first school was Newall Infants School, then the National School (now Cross Green Community Centre), and finally Prince Henry's Grammar School.

Did you go to college or university? If so, where?

I went to Harrogate Tech College to learn shorthand and typing and other office skills. And then later, in preparation for ordination, I went to St. John's College, Nottingham, to study theology where I got my BA degree.

When did you become a Christian?

I would say from when I was baptised at just a few weeks old. God was very real and personal to me even as a young child, and once I was confirmed I started going to the 8am Communion Service most weeks. From the age of 8 I believed that God was calling me to be a missionary and at the age of 18 I started training as a nurse to facilitate that. As my faith gradually developed the possibility of ministry being here in England crystalized, leading me to be ordained in 2000. My faith is still developing, and I continue to rejoice as I see His mercy is new every morning, and His faithful love never ends.

When and where did you meet your husband?

When I was about 18, I met Stephen in Otley at the Church Youth Club in Burras Lane. This has now been converted into town houses which are adjacent to Vicarage Gardens.

What was your occupation, and where did you work? I've had quite a few. My first job was at the TSB bank here in Manor Square. Then I went to train as a nurse at Leeds General Infirmary, but left when I got married. I then worked in a bakery shop, as a school cleaner, and then for many years as a home help. When we left Otley, I worked as a carer for people living in the community with mental health issues, and had several other part-time jobs until eventually I was ordained. I have worked in various parishes from an urban priority area in the Bristol Diocese, to a very different kind of parish in Stopham & Fittleworth in the Chichester Diocese. Now, I'm pleased to have Permission to Officiate in the Leeds Diocese.

Do you have any brothers and sisters?

I have an older brother, David, and some of you may know my younger sister, Pam, here at OPC.

How many children do you have - and their names?

Our first child, Mikila, very sadly died when still a baby. Our other children are Rebecca and Tim who are in their 50s. They both live in the same high rise block of flats in Kirkstall, Leeds.

After being born in Otley, where else have you lived?

Yes, I was born in Otley and lived here for about 30 years until Stephen went to Theological College in Chichester in about 1982. We then lived

in various parishes. I retired early with ill health when we were living in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. We continued living there for some while before moving back to West Yorkshire in Bramhope, just 4 miles from Otley.

Did you worship anywhere before coming to Otley Parish Church?

Before going straight home after my birth my mum brought me here where she was churched. I came regularly as a child and through my teenage years. I was married here in 1971. Except for a short interlude when I was expecting Mikila, Stephen and I continued here until he went to college. Since then, we have lived and worshipped in various parishes until I retired about 15 years ago. Now we worship at St Giles in Bramhope, as well as at OPC.

Do you have a favourite verse(s) of Scripture?

I have so many, that it's difficult to choose just one. But this passage has been significant for me many times in my life. It's Lamentations 3:21-33.

Do you have a favourite Christian hymn or song?

Lots! "Just a closer walk with thee" and "O Jesus I have promised to serve thee to the end".

Do you like classical music? Do you have a favourite piece(s)? Ketelbèy's "In a Monastery Garden", Pachelbel's "Canon in D Major", Borodin's "Polovtsian Dances".

What about modern songs or music – anything in particular?

"The Sound of Silence" by Simon and Garfunkel, and "Bridge Over Troubled Water" by Paul Simon.

Can you play a musical instrument?

None properly, but I taught myself to play the flute for a while. I was invited to play in Nashville with a Frets Orchestra where I was learning to play a mandolin. Unfortunately, we moved parishes at that time, so I missed out on a trip to Tennessee. In all honesty, I wasn't very good! My favourite instrument is my bowed psaltery which has a beautiful haunting sound.

Do you have a favourite part of Yorkshire you like to visit?

I love the Dales, especially Swaledale. As for towns and cities I've

always liked Harrogate, although I haven't been for quite a long time so don't know what it's like now.

Is there somewhere you would like to go on holiday where you've not been before, regardless of cost?

I don't really enjoy travelling these days but when I was younger, I would like to have seen the Pyramids in Egypt, and the State Hermitage Museum of art and culture in Saint Petersburg, Russia.

A book you enjoyed reading – Christian or general? Any special reason?

You are asking someone who has over 1,000 books on her Kindle, so not sure how to pick my most favourite. Maybe, St Teresa of Avila's "The Interior Castle". In fiction, the Starbridge series by Susan Howatch, which gives an interesting view of Anglicanism from the war onwards looking at events from the perspectives of different, connected people.

Do you have a hobby or something you enjoy doing to relax?

I like spinning and crochet (I have to use all that spun yarn somehow) and thread painting embroidery. Also, inkle weaving and I'm now learning bobbin lace and tatting, and I enjoy dabbling in pastel painting.

What would be your favourite meal - 2 or even 3 courses?

A proper Chinese banquet, e.g. Tung po mutton, fire prawns, beef in black bean sauce, lemon chicken, and fried seaweed and rice. I used to enjoy cooking Chinese meals, but that is beyond me now.

If you were to spend a whole year on a desert island on your own, what luxury would you take with you?

I would want my spinning wheel (and some oil to keep it going) and an endless supply of wool fibre to spin. If I could sneak it in my pocket, I'd appreciate my kindle but I'd have to rig up some sort of dynamo with my spinning wheel to keep it charged. I hope I can also have my Bible with me!

OUR CHURCHYARD WORK PARTY




Survivors of the pruning party!

Many thanks to our superb team of volunteers for their great work at our Churchyard pruning day (Saturday 16 November). In keeping with modern thinking, almost 50% of the dozen plus volunteers were female, and the Vicar's young family represented the upcoming generation. Everyone worked well and we surpassed all our objectives for the day. Three large storm broken branches were soon cut into manageable pieces to build wildlife habitat piles in the north-west corner. There, a massive and high bramble thicket was trimmed into a manageable patch, revealing several young holly trees. At the other end ivy was carefully trimmed and removed from graves thus showing their lettering. Elsewhere, late flowering ivy was left for the many bees feeding in the fortuitous sunshine. Many leaves were blown, raked and gathered from the paths and verges to make them safe. The leaf patrol pile previously the size of Pen-y-ghent was increased to that of Snowden (although no one could quite remember the proper Welsh name, even though Keith is old Welsh for Man of the Forest.)

We enjoyed tea, coffee, biscuits and mince pies at 11 o'clock which speeded us on to conclude at 12 o'clock. A great day's work was done in just half a day. Many thanks again to our brilliant team of volunteers.

Rest and be patient


Turn down the speed and volume of our lives and tune into God, experiencing His peace and wait patiently for Him to work in your life.

Phillip Brooks attended a midnight service at the Church of the Holy Nativity in Bethlehem in 1865 and later wrote 'O Little Town of Bethlehem'

If 'O Little Town of Bethlehem' feels like a vivid picture of Christ's birthplace, that's probably because the author, Phillip Brooks, had been there.

Brooks was an Episcopal priest, abolitionist, teacher of preachers, who witnessed to Helen Keller (American author) and became an ecumenically popular Bishop of Massachusetts.

On Christmas Eve 1865 he went to a midnight service at the Church of the Holy Nativity in Bethlehem. Here's what he said about it: 'I remember standing in the old church in Bethlehem, close to the spot where Jesus was born, when the whole church was ringing hour after hour with splendid hymns of praise to God, how again and again it seemed as if I could hear voices I knew well, telling each other of the wonderful night of the Saviour's birth.'

In that pre-electric age, the streets would indeed have been 'dark', and the stillness would have been much deeper than today. Brooks took this powerful sensory experience and peopled it with the characters of the Christmas story.

Here is Christ born of Mary (Matthew 1:16) and the angels keeping their watch of wondering love (Luke 2:13-14).

The carol is also full of theology, not in a heavy-handed statement of doctrine, but in a preacher's interpretation of what the doctrine really means in the life of the believer. 'How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given; so God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heaven '

There is a deep feeling and poetic vision in these verses, arising from a profound engagement with the events they describe. The theme which runs through them is that Christmas is not just a single historical event: it is God breaking in to the world, which happens not just when his Son is incarnate, but when his will is done.

A verse which is not generally found in hymnbooks today runs:

Where children pure and happy Pray to the blessèd Child, Where misery cries out to thee, Son of the mother mild: Where charity stands watching And faith holds wide the door, The dark night wakes, the glory breaks, And Christmas comes once more.

You may be more familiar with these lines from the third verse: 'No ear may hear his coming, but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive him, still, the dear Christ enters in.' And here's part of the final verse, a prayer that really brings us into the story: 'Cast out our sin, and enter in, be born in us today.' There is a profound truth here, that Christ comes into the world, not only at Bethlehem 2,000 years ago but through us, his disciples, wherever we are.
